No Shortage of Activity At, Around Lake Carmi



For those opening camp just before Memorial Day, it certainly was a soggy beginning to the season. Although I did

not have my rain gauge set up, I'm told that multiple inches fell Friday to Saturday of the holiday weekend.

A quick look at the dam confirmed the significant precipitation. A substantial volume of water flowed over the crest and into the spillway on its way north. A stark contrast to last year when we experienced very little rain, the dam virtually silent for most of the season.

"We do need the rain" is a saying we all embrace. Moreover, there is nothing like an afternoon thunderstorm on the lake or watching a storm coming across the water. These acts of nature seem more magnificent at the lake. Let's hope, however, that they don't spoil any outdoor summer activities.

Speaking of Memorial Day, you certainly don't have to go far to see a little Americana in Vermont. I'm speaking of the Franklin Memorial Day Parade. It is not a big parade, but it is no less sincere in honoring our fallen service men and women.

The parade starts at Franklin Elementary School and winds its way down Square Road to Hanna Road, then onto Main Street. Entrants range from honored veterans to school children. The bands play and the fire trucks and decorated floats pass by. It eventually ends at the town park, where a memorial service takes place. This year one of the most stirring renditions of Taps was played by a young bugler. The ceremony is moving and is a fitting tribute to our military heroes. The Memorial Day Parade in Franklin is a significant positive reflection on the fabric of a small town that has a very a big heart.

Speaking of Franklin, the LCCA is sponsoring a concert at the Town Park on Thursday, July 7. The Citizens Band, a local, 50-piece band will perform, preceded by a terrific Ice Cream Social courtesy of the Franklin United and East Franklin Churches. 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Meet the New Franklin Watershed Coordinator

Franklin Watershed Update

By Julia Crocker, Coordinator, Franklin Watershed Committee Hello all. My name is Julia Crocker, and I am so excited to be the new Watershed Coordinator for the Franklin Watershed Committee!

I was born and raised in Franklin County and have been spending my summers up here at our family camp on Lake Carmi. Back in May I finished my

undergraduate career at the University of New England and received my B.S. in Marine Science, with a concentration in Marine Biology. I can't wait to get to work at the lake and assist in guaranteeing the future health of Lake Carmi.

Growing up at Lake Carmi means that I have seen firsthand how the health of the lake has declined. The algal blooms have become more persistent, and the milfoil has been steadily encroaching on the shore. I am so thankful that I am now in a position to help with the numerous efforts and projects of the Franklin Watershed Committee to bring the lake back to health!

This summer we continue our tributary sampling and testing of phosphorus levels, which causes cyanobacteria blooms, aka blue-green algae. We will also meet with farmers and landowners to discuss Best Management Practices, or BMPs, to decrease the input of phosphorus and other nutrients. We will continue monitoring blue-green algae blooms and work on lake-friendly shoreline projects.

I will also take on the role of Boat Greeter at the north shore boat launch! The goal of the boat greeter program is to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species in and out of Lake Carmi. Aquatic invasive species such as Eurasian water milfoil outcompete native species and decimate local ecosystems.

When launching your boat or pulling it from a body of water, always make sure to check for any hitchhikers that may be hiding in your hull, trailer, or bilge. Even if it's not an invasive species, it's still illegal to transport living organisms from one water body to another. So if you see me at the launch this summer, don't be surprised if I ask to give your boat a brief inspection! April 4, 2022, at 12:25 p.m. That's when the ice went out on Lake Carmi this year. What lucky individual guessed the time closest to win the big prize? Read on and find out.

The Lake Carmi Campers Association Ice Out Contest began in 2008, founded by former LCCA President Dick Lang and former LCCA Board Director Jim Pivirotto. Dick and Jim coordinated the event until 2012, when it was taken over former LCCA Board Director Larry Myott. After being put on hiatus for a few years, the LCCA decided in 2021 to resurrect the event.

The LCCA Ice Out's primary purpose was two-fold: 1) to get folks excited and thinking about the lake during the cold days of winter/early spring and 2) to help the association raise money to protect and preserve the lake we all love.

Contest clock-keeper Joe Craig placed a device on the ice, far out from shore. It was tied to shore via rope that was connected to an alarm clock. When the device dropped to the lake bottom, the alarm clock unplugged, determining the exact time of the ice out. High-tech science!



This year's winner was Ruth Ann Krayesky, summer resident on Camp Road at Lake Carmi. When asked what her secret to winning was, Ruth Ann replied, " Buy \$100 worth of tickets!"

Her winning guess was April 4, 2022, at 12:23 p.m. only 2 minutes from the actual time of 12:25 p.m. on

April 4. Coming a close second was Peter Benevento, with a time of 11:48 a.m. on April 4, and third place was Stephen Benson with a time of 1 p.m.

This date was relatively early based on information I was able to locate. The only earlier date I could find since the inception of this contest (based on info in previous LCCA newsletters) was March 22, 2012.

The ice out contest had a 50/50 payout, with 50 percent after expenses going to the winner and 50 percent going to the Lake Carmi Community Foundation. Revenue generated for this event was \$1,746, the largest amount to date raised for this initiative. After expenses, total payout to the winner was \$802.72. And to top it off, Ruth Ann chose to keep only \$100 of her winnings (the cost of the tickets she purchased) and donated the remainder to the LCCA Clean Water Fund!

A big THANK YOU shout out to Ruth Ann for her extreme generosity!

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


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The Challenge of Legacy

Of course, Lake Carmi is a legacy, as well. The cold, hard truth of it is that no one has to do the hard work being conducted by the LCCA, the Franklin Watershed Committee, area agricultural leaders, and so many others. The lake could be left to whither and die.

Good things don't come easy, though. And that's as true for legacies as it is for anything else.





A crow, strident and raucous, woke me this morning just as the sun crawled above the eastern treeline. What a mad bird the crow is, an innercity personality in rural surroundings; one morning I want to shoot him and the next star his crazy ass in a movie.

I rolled over, looked out at the lake, and saw a loon no more than twenty feet off the dock. Arising, I grabbed the binoculars off their hook, opened the porch door, and walked out to the bench on the shoreline. The loon, a healthy adult male, was not bothered by my intrusion.

After a time he dove. First once, then twice for his customary halfminute. On his second surfacing, he came up with a crawdad, which he toyed with and then swallowed whole with a lurch of his banded neck. He then, quite literally, shook a tailfeather.

Still apparently uncaring of my close proximity, the loon then twisted his handsome head a full one-hundred-and-eighty degrees, tucking it into the groove between his backside feathers and taking, what I can only assume to be, a snooze.

He was startled a short time later by a low-flying kingfisher, and responded by taking another dive. He surfaced thirty seconds later and continued his drift, albeit a bit further from the shore. Slowly, this strangely elegant bird swam away from the shore, diving whenever the muse moved him.

It wasn't until the noise from the morning's first outboard motor prompted him to take to the airways that I finally lost sight of this loon. If you have never seen a loon leave the water, I can tell you that it is one of the wonders of flight, and that after watching him for the first hundred yards any sensible betting man, if such a creature exists, would wager a week's pay that this bird wasn't leaving the water. But, after much splashing and near crashing, leave he does into semi-graceful flight, and at last calls a good-bye from a distant marsh. That call, that eerie wailing on a faint wind, stays with me like the music in my head.

I write of this incident for I am leaving this place in a few days, a place that has brought me many pleasures such as this one over the last eight years. Herons, beavers, ducks, otters, sandpipers, deer, phoebes, raccoons, robins, bullfrogs, swallows, coyotes, ospreys, yes, even the crow, I thank them all for being here, and showing my spirit the path home when it was lost.

But it is the loon, elusive and singular, who has most often lighted my way. He is me, he is my mother, he is my wife, he is my children, he is we. He is painted on my material possessions and etched on the walls of my mind, a spiritual reminder of the nature of things.

So, I am moved to believe that this morning's visit was a cosmic event, a final salute to and from my totem. Farewell and godspeed, we seemed to say to one another.

Or was that cosmic projection all in my head, which can not be cranked around one-hundred-and-eighty degrees and hidden in tailfeathers?

Instead, my head takes issue with my spirit and tells me this loon was just another matter of random fate, that timing is something only humans are hung up on, that there is no beginning and no end, and this was just another loon on another morning.

Why then did the crow wake me? Just to piss me off? Or did he know too that random fate can only explain so much, and that sometimes even the most stubborn of skeptics must read the writing on the water left by the wandering loon?

Later, my mystical feathered friend, for we shall meet again on a further shore. Until then, keep a close watch on this place I love.

A Brief History of Franklin Telephone Co.

In the mid-1890s, Charles W. Gates constructed a "line" from Franklin to the train stop at North Sheldon near the present Dodd Farm. This "line" was used to communicate with the Farmer's Exchange store and the railroad for shipments.

And so began the Franklin Telephone Co., Inc.

Back then, customers used magneto "crank" phones. All calls went through the switchboard, unless you were calling someone on your party line. It was very common that customers were all on party lines, with the exception of the Farmer's Exchange and the local doctor. Longtime employee Ruth Toof answered and connected the calls at the switchboard. Ruth knew everything that was going on in town. A switchboard and some old telephones are on display at Franklin Telephone Company office.


Paul H. and Vera Gates ran the telephone company for the longest time, from the early 1920s until Paul's death in 1956. Then his son Charles ran it until Hugh returned from the US Navy in 1963. During that time, there were very few telephone lines installed in the camps at Lake Carmi. There were pay phones located at the bowling alley, East Franklin store, West Berkshire store and the Miller's store (a little summer store located at the junction of Lake Road and Dewing Road).

In the 1960s, Hugh and Cynthia Gates returned from Navy duty to run the company. The switchboard was replaced with a used Northern Electric switch, purchased from New England Telephone. Customers' magneto phones were replaced with fancy new rotary phones. As part of the upgrade, Hugh Gates, the new manager, let customers choose the color rotary phone they wanted.

There used to be a four-party line on the Patton Shore, for each of the customers to play bridge. So it didn't matter whose camp they were playing at because they could answer their calls based on the special ring they heard (i.e. one long, two short, a long and a short, or two long rings).

In the 1990s, the first digital switch was installed, allowing such features as touch-tone, call forwarding, and call waiting. Just before 2000, the last party line disappeared.

Today, the fourth and fifth generations of the Gates family work at Franklin Telephone Company. We are on our fourth digital switch and have been deploying fiber optics for improved internet service. Upgraded VDSL service is also available around Lake Carmi.


