Considering Lake Carmi's History & Future

I know there are plenty of topics around the lake to write about, but one that keeps reoccurring is how we refer to the homes on the lake.

Originally intended as weekend fishing camps, the word stuck, and "camp" became the norm. The Lake Carmi "Campers" Assoc. was established, and at some point in our history, little, green, metal signs resembling license plates were distributed.



The signs identified each camp around the lake by number. My sign read "Camp 72.".

As the lake evolved, weekend camps gave way to seasonal

homes, and people began to refer to them as "cottages." The term became even more common with the advent of the LCCA Cottage Tours.

However, the fact of the matter is that "camp" remains the most frequently used term. On numerous occasions, I have asked friends if I should remove my shoes as I enter their door, and invariably the reply is, "Leave your shoes on; its camp!"

I rest my case.

I would however like to know the history of the little metal green signs. Especially whoever had "Camp 1." If anyone knows, please get back to me at <u>President@LakeCarmiVT.com</u>. The evolution of the green signs is probably a story unto itself.

We continue to monitor the condition of the lake daily. Unfortunately, both the north and south aeration systems were down for a period earlier in the summer. This is the third year, and we have not had the opportunity to evaluate the aeration project based on an uninterrupted season of operation. The entire system, however, has now been running 24/7 for well over a month. We also have the continued, unwavering support from Everblue Lakes and the State of Vermont to see this project through to its success.

The third TMDL Coordination Team meeting of the season is scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 26, at 4 p.m. The Aeration Project ,as well as other critical path projects developed through the Crisis Response Plan, will be discussed. I encourage you to participate. I assume at this point the meeting will be virtual. The link to the meeting will be distributed when available.

Speaking of meetings, we cancelled the Aug. 7 LCCA Annual Meeting and Pot Luck Supper due to the rising prevalence of COVID. The meeting will be held virtually via Zoom on Wed., Sept. 1-at 7 p.m.

A priority agenda item will be to approve the proposed revisions to the LCCA

Constitution and By-laws. The major changes include:

- 1) Under extenuating circumstances, Directors may exceed term limits upon approval of the Board.
- 2) The Executive Committee is redefined as President, Vice President, Secretary & Treasurer and is empowered to act between Board meetings with subsequent approval by the Board.
- 3) The distinction between Recording & Corresponding Secretary is eliminated and is combined into one Board position.

Another aspect of the Annual Meeting will be the election of Directors. A total of three Directors are on the slate, each for a three year term. When you read my introduction, click on "2019-2020 report," and the pages will unfold. I'm sure you will find it a very interesting evaluation of the fish in our lake.

Also, please remember that there are only a few weeks left in the Annual LCCA Fishing Contest, which ends Labor Day, Sept. 6. Trophies will be awarded in both the Junior & Senior Divisions for Pike, Walleye & Bass Last year the Juniors outfished the Seniors in 3 of 5 categories. Good luck to all down the stretch! A Successful Farm Day and Getting LakeWise

We hope everyone is having a great summer so far and that you all have been able to enjoy Lake Carmi! It feels like the summer has flown by, but we have been busy doing what we can to help improve water quality and protect the lake. We continue tributary sampling throughout the summer. Despite the seemingly rainy few



weeks we had towards the end of July, most of the tributaries have remained dry, leaving few sites with running water to sample. We plan to continue sampling as possible for the remainder of the summer, into the fall. As mentioned before, you can check out the FWC's website at any time to see up to date photos from our tributary sampling at www.franklinwatershed.org/tributary-sampling-2021.html.

In addition to tributary sampling, we continue to have both boat greeters working throughout the summer to do our best to prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species. As we get towards the end of summer, it is particularly important to remember to check your boats or other watercraft for any plant matter when removing them from the lake and transporting them elsewhere. At Lake Carmi, as many of you know, the main invasive plant we have is the Eurasion Milfoil. By now the plant has had time to grow so it is far more likely to catch onto boats and other watercraft.

Around mid-late July, we began seeing the first significant algae blooms of the season at Lake Carmi. We will continue to sample sites weekly around the lake, but it is critical that you use caution before jumping into the lake or allowing pets and kids to go for a swim. You can go to www.healthvermont.gov/tracking/cyanobacteria-tracker for more information on cyanobacteria and how to identify it. If you spot a bloom on your shoreline, it would be very helpful if you took a few photos and sent them to me at tuckerwehnerfwc@gmail.com. We appreciate your help in keeping the community safe!

On Wednesday, Aug. 4, we attended Farm Day, hosted by Tim and Martha Magnant. It was a beautiful day in Franklin to meet some folks who have been doing so much to help protect our waterways. We also had the opportunity to check out the manure injector, and Jim Dewing gave us a demonstration to see it in action. We are so thankful for all the farmers who are using methods such as manure injection to reduce nutrient runoff into the lake. Thank you, farmers! (See photos from Farm Day on page 9.)

We have also been working to revamp the LakeWise program at Lake Carmi. A survey was sent out about a month ago, and we have begun reaching out to folks and evaluating some properties. If you filled out the survey and have not heard from me yet, I will be reaching out to you soon! We gave out the first new LakeWise award to Peter Pfefferle and Natacha Carpentier on Black Woods Road. Congratulations to them, and thank you for doing your part to protect the lake!

While the summer seems to be flying by, its not over yet! We will continue our work and hope you all have a great August and are able to enjoy this wonderful lake as much as possible. If you have any questions, concerns, or comments, please don't hesitate to reach out to me.

The annual Farm Meeting – hosted by UVM Extension, the Friends of Northern Lake Champlain ,and the Farmer's Watershed Alliance – was recently held at the Bridgeman View Farm in Franklin. The meeting was a great chance to learn what progressive farming techniques are practiced in our watershed, and this year was no exception.

There was a terrific live demonstration of the hayfield manure injection system, as well as a very informative presentation in a cornfield regarding the integration of cover crops. All of this and more is being done to limit the impact of farming on our water quality. We truly appreciate these efforts and the amount of work required to implement them.


