The Benefits of a Wet Summer at Lake Carmi

Is wetter better? I don't know. We have certainly experienced an unprecedented rain fall this summer. I have been recording rain totals in a rain gauge given to me by DEC more than a decade ago, and I can't recall a July where we received more than nine inches of rain. Yes, nine inches. Mind you, my records are far from official, but they do correlate to the rainfall totals throughout the state. Fortunately, we did not experience the devastation the poor people in the middle of the state endured. Our hearts, thoughts and prayers go out to them.



W h a t w e experienced, however, was a hiatus from the algae blooms th a t h a v e plagued us in recent years. I s a y h i a t u s

because I don't believe the weather has solved our problems. It has just given us a respite. Legacy phosphorous that is released into the water column in spring and summer fuels the algae blooms. The experts claim that the intense rains have washed the legacy phosphorous out of the water column. This is evident not only in the lack of BGA blooms but also in the consistent, constant flow of water over the Mill Pond Dam. Usually in the middle of August, the dam is still, but this year the flow is as steady as it was in April.

So, is wetter better for Lake Carmi? Maybe in the short term, but for longer lasting, scientifically confirmed results, I'm going all in with the upcoming Lake Carmi Alum Feasibility Study.

Last year, after a very disappointing 2022 season for water quality, I reported that I was very frustrated, but like any good football team we had to drop back and punt and re-evaluate our game plan. Over the winter, we petitioned the Clean Water Board to

fund an Alum Feasibility Study, and we were very fortunate to have our request granted. In July, a new member was added to our team: Barr Engineering of Minnesota. VT DEC awarded a contract to Barr Engineering to perform an Alum Feasibility Study for Lake Carmi. A significant part of our journey to end the blue green algae blooms has officially begun.

The Barr engineering website states that the company's "...engineers, scientists and technical specialists work together to help clients develop, mange, process and restore natural resources." I put the emphasis on restore as this is what we are hoping for at Lake Carmi. Keith Pilgrim, a Senior Water Resources Scientist at Barr, recently spoke at the LCCA Annual Meeting. He gave a very informative presentation as to what he intends to do and how he will accomplish it. Basically, he will determine if an Alum application is appropriate for Lake Carmi, where it should be applied, and how much alum will be required. A report stating the findings will be issued sometime over the winter. If alum is

recommended, the earliest possible application will be the fall of 2024. This, however, is dependent on overcoming substantial hurdles between now and then. More on that to follow. Right now, we just need to focus on the study.

The study will commence in October with the extraction of multiple core samples of sediment from the bottom of the lake. Much of the data and conclusions drawn will emanate from the analysis of the sediment. We, the LCCA, will endeavor to provide you with pictures and as many updates as possible over the coming months. We will also be sending out information on alum and

Lots of Workshops as Another Season Winds Down

Hello folks.

I hope you've all had a fun and enjoyable summer thus far. It is always sad to see another camp season come to an end. However, there is still plenty of time to enjoy the lake! There are still several slots open for Stream Wise evaluations! If you are unfamiliar with Stream Wise, it is a new program affiliated with the Lake Champlain Basin Program to provide resources to landowners adjacent to streams and rivers to protect and restore stream health. The program emphasizes the importance of vegetated buffers along streams and encourages folks to protect and/or nurture theirs. Preserving stream health within the Franklin



watershed is vital improving the health of Lake Carmi. The tributaries surrounding the lake are one of the largest sources of external phosphorus loading. If you or someone you know has property on a stream and is interested in a visit please reach out to jcrocker5@une.edu or (802) 825-1243! You do not need to be present for the evaluation.

This month the Franklin County Natural Resources Conservation District hosted two Watershed Workshops at the Franklin Homestead! This first one was held on Aug. 1, titled *Healthy Shorelines Part 2: Lake Wise Tips for Homeowners.* Lauren Weston of the FCNRCD gave an informative and interactive presentation about how to make your property as lake-friendly as possible. She walked the audience through the motto *Slow it, Sink it, Spread it, Store it.* This is the idea guiding landowners on how to best mitigate stormwater runoff and excess nutrients before it enters the lake.

The second workshop held this month took place on Aug 21, titled *Healthy Streams: How Watersheds Impact Lake Health.* Guest speaker Staci Pomeroy, the river scientist for the VTDEC, spoke about the science of streams, what a healthy one looks like, and what we can do to improve stream health on our own property. Healthy streams provide habitat for fish and other wildlife, and reduce sediment and nutrient loading into lakes. This improves the overall health of the lake system. The key to a healthy stream is a hearty, vegetated buffer on the stream bank. A stream that looks "messy" is actually the sign of a thriving ecosystem!

Both workshops featured productive discussions about the topics at hand and gave folks a chance to share what they learned and how they might apply it to their own shorelines. The fourth and final workshop, held Sept. 5 at the Franklin Homestead FELCO Room, was titled *Lake Science 101: Lake Chemistry and Biology Basics* and featured guest speaker Matt Vaughn of the Lake Champlain Basin Program. Recordings of previous workshops can be found on the FCNRCD website at franklincountynrcd.org/ lakecarmi.

Finally, our boat greeters have wrapped up for the summer! During the summer months, they played an



Franklin History Corner The Saving Waters of Lake Carmi

The waters of Lake Carmi have played a saving role in Franklin and the surrounding area more than once.

In 1975, severe lack of rain caused a drought that threatened the dairy farms in the area. Sen. Branon of Fairfield met with Gov. Salmon, andhe asked the Legislature Emergency Board back to get many loads of water.

In April of 2021, the Franklin Fire Department coordinated w i t h Canadian



fire departments to extinguish a fire that started on the Canadian

side and spread to our side of the border. Two Canadian tanker planes scooped up about 15 loads of water, with each load being 1,300 to 1,800 gallons.

New Owners Bring Enthusiasm, Optimism, Creemees to Franklin General Store

In the year 2000, there were 250 general stores in Vermont. Only 90 survive today. Discount chains, bigbox stores, on-line retail, and credit card fees stifled many once proud

centers of community and commerce.

Patti and Ken Corey hope to beat the odds. They bought Franklin's General Store this summer on June 12, and are optimistic about the future. "I listen to the customers, welcome their input, and try to bring it in," Patti said.

Patti grew up just down the street, where she walked to Franklin Elementary, and graduated from MVU. Her maiden name, Bishop, is as deeply rooted in this tight-knit, rural community as her married one - Corey. Ken's grandparents, Merrill and Eva, were prominent members of the grange, and his mother — Mary Lou — represented Franklin in the legislature.

Hard work and community service is in their genes. Patti Corey sees opportunity in 3,678 square feet, even though it's just a tenth o f а modern supermarket. "Smiles and laughter are the norm here," Patti said, "We're all about customer service."

The Coreys are embracing continuity and change. The Facebook page their daughter Katie created for the store has 632 followers. That's why LCCA President Pete Benevento made a bee line for the newest shipment of Lake Carmi T-shirts. "I saw them online and knew they'd go fast," he exclaimed while examining the stock.

Patti and Ken are using the internet to promote lunch specials, baked goods, and local products. Next - over which just seven families have presided in 130 years.

To level shelves, the Coreys jacked up floors that were laid before the Civil War. Their son Bradley looks forward to building a new kitchen

> with his father, tripling it in size by incorporating former clothing and stock rooms.

Look for the roll out of a larger bakery line, including doughnuts - which are in development. The extra elbow room will make holiday and batch-baking easier - including preparing 92 dozen rolls for the annual Fire Department BBQ.

With breakfast sandwiches and pastries at opening, lunch at 11, and pizza until a half hour 'til closing, there's no shortage of tasks for the Coreys, who were already operating the former commune and Towle farms. Ken will preside over the butcher shop, offering "freshly ground hamburg at affordable prices." He and Patti are pleased that "Paul Greenwood, who taught Bill Mayo to cut meat" is returning to train their team.

A century ago, Franklin had five mercantiles: J.M. Hill at Morses Line, Gilberts in East Franklin, and the trio



All of these events contributed to a very fun, entertaining and festive atmosphere around the lake and throughout the summer.




